Dear Friends,

It's that time again. Yes, the season we all love is coming soon – Lent. I don't mean to sound sarcastic, because we really do like Lent. There is something about this season that speaks to the depths of our souls. It begins with the blessing of the ashes and those words on Ash Wednesday, "Remember you are dust and unto dust you shall return." These words are so powerful. They remind us that God gave us life and we are nothing without Him. Lent is a time for us to reflect on that reality. We need to do this because we often get distracted from this truth. It's interesting to recall that the word Lent actually comes from a word meaning "Spring." So, Lent is meant to be a new "Springtime" for all of us. We are called to intensify our



prayer, fasting and almsgiving during Lent. These ancient practices help to prepare us for Easter and ultimately for the Kingdom of Heaven.

In one of my recent conversations with Father Betz, he made a statement that really struck me. He said, "Everyone is looking for a religious experience today – something spectacular in their lives." And then he commented that we have the most profound opportunities for a religious experience right before us all the time in the Mass and in the Sacrament of Confession. So true! Think about that, please. What could be more powerful than to receive Jesus in Holy Communion and have your sins forgiven?

We tend to give things up for Lent, and that is good, but let's also remember that we are called to do something special for Lent. Some ideas... You could attend weekday Mass. There is nothing greater than the Mass! Have you ever been at a Mass with the school children during the week? If not, you are missing something very special. My mother will make the trip down here occasionally to simply attend a Mass with the children. She loves to hear their voices and experience their lively participation. Another great Lenten practice is praying the Stations of the Cross. You could pray the Stations of the Cross each day. We also have times when we do this communally at our parishes each week during Lent. This is a great way to remember what our Lord went through for us and how He calls us to take up our own cross and carry it with Him. You could also celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation. During this Year of Mercy we are being invited to encounter the greatness of Jesus' mercy and to share it with the world. If it's been a while since you've made a good confession, come back. The Lord loves you and wants you to know His mercy. His mercy changes lives. Open your heart to Him this Lent.



So, Father Betz is right; we all really want to have a deep religious experience. We want to encounter God's love in our lives and feel His peace deep within us. I hope you will have a religious experience this Lent. The opportunities are available. It's up to us to make it happen. I hope this Lent will be like a "springtime" for us. If it is, we will have a glorious Easter.

AUTOMATIC ELECTRONIC GIVING



In a series of revelations, He taught her that His mercy is unlimited and available even to the greatest sinners, and He revealed special ways for people to respond to His mercy.



Urging St. Faustina to pray the Divine Mercy Chaplet often, Jesus told her: "My daughter, encourage souls to say the chaplet which I have given you. It pleases Me to grant everything they ask of Me by saying the chaplet. By saying the chaplet you are bringing humankind closer to me".

It is in the silence that God speaks to us.

Have you ever been driving and you hear that familiar "ding" alerting you that someone has just sent you a text? What do you do? Texting and driving is not safe. But, who could it be? Does someone need something? Would it hurt to take a peek? This has probably happened to most of us. Well, what do you do? How did this one distraction begin? A "ding"; a noise.

In Matthew Kelly's book, *The Four Signs of a Dynamic Catholic*, he discusses C.S. Lewis, a great Christian writer who during World War II wrote a weekly column. In these writings an apprentice devil was given the task to win a man's soul from God for the devil. The apprentice thought of many ways to tempt this young man, but the senior devil explained their simple plan. The plan: to create so much noise in the world that man can no longer hear the voice of God in his life. How can we hear God speak to us when we are constantly surrounded by noise? We must find a way to break through the noise and find silence. We can do that through prayer.



Prayer is one of the four "signs" that Dynamic Catholics make a part of their lives. One of the biggest challenges people face with prayer is that noise the devil constantly throws at us. Many times the Bible describes Jesus going away to a quiet place to pray. If it works for Jesus, it will certainly work for us. Kelly developed "The Prayer Process" to help simplify and instill a routine of prayer. The process is developed from the daily examination of conscience. It begins by finding a quiet place to pray at a regular time each day.

The Prayer Process

Gratitude: Begin by thanking God in a personal dialogue for whatever you are most grateful for today.

Awareness: Revisit the times in the past twenty-four hours when you were and were not the-best-version-of-yourself. Talk to God about these situations and what you have learned from them.

Significant Moments: Identify something you experienced today and explore what God might be trying to say to you through that event (or person).

Peace: Ask God to forgive you for any wrong you have committed (against yourself, another person, or him) and to fill you with a deep and abiding peace.

Freedom: Speak with God about how he is inviting you to change your life, so that you can experience the freedom to be the best-version-of-yourself.

Others: Lift up to God anyone you feel called to pray for today, asking God to bless and guide them. Finish by praying the Our Father.

We are challenged to implement this process daily. Remove yourself from the "dings" in life, the distractions, the noise every day and pray. For it is in the silence that God speaks to us!

MARK YOUR CALENDAR REJOICE: A Catholic Community Celebration



Natural Family Planning

This quarter we ask one of our newly trained practitioners to give their witness. Thank you to Matt and Amy Miller for your beautiful story!

My husband Matt and I learned the Creighton Model of natural family planning six months before we were married and have continued to use it throughout our 13 years of marriage. Unlike many other couples we know, it was his suggestion to learn natural family planning. Honestly, I was unsure about using a natural method, but quickly came to appreciate the Creighton Model and what it could teach us not only about family planning, but also about having a strong, Christ-centered marriage.



We joyfully welcomed our son Isaac just before our fifth anni-

versary. About two and a half years later, we found ourselves expecting again. Our joy this time was unfortunately brief and we lost our second child to miscarriage about six weeks into the pregnancy. Shortly after that, Isaac was diagnosed with pediatric cancer. All our efforts went to his care and adding to our family was quickly placed on hold. In 2012 Isaac lost his battle with cancer and we were left with a large hole, both in our lives and in our hearts.

When we decided it was time to try to have more children, our Fertility Care Practitioner was there to support us and help decipher some issues we were experiencing. She referred us to a local medical consultant who is also trained in the use of the Creighton Model. He was able to look at my charts, order some simple lab work, and diagnose a hormonal imbalance that was keeping us from conceiving. Under his care, we conceived again but were once more met with sadness as we faced another miscarriage.

Our local doctor did all he could for us and then referred us on to an OBGYN in St. Louis with more advanced knowledge of the Creighton Model. This doctor suspected another hormone imbalance and that I most likely had endometriosis, a disease that also affected my mother and grandmother. After losing a third child to miscarriage, he recommended surgery to remove the endometriosis to hopefully increase our fertility and give us the chance to have the child we so desperately wanted. I am pleased to say that just a few months after the surgery, we were able to conceive using the tools we learned through our Creighton Model education and are expecting a child in April 2016.

When the opportunity to become a Fertility Care Practitioner presented itself, I knew I couldn't let it pass by. The Creighton Model has meant so much and done so much for my family, I feel very fortunate to be able to educate our community on the benefits of using a natural system of family planning and fertility care.

We have exciting news....we have three new ladies that have just finished their first phase in becoming a Creighton Model Fertility System Practioner. Amy Miller, Janet Dilger and Kelli Lovell. These ladies are from Evansville and are now available to take new clients. Thanks to everyone for your prayers and support for this beautiful ministry!


