

You can also enrich your marriage with the award winning video series called Beloved: Finding Happiness in Marriage. These videos offer insights to help strengthen your marriage and family life.

FORMED also offers some great Lenten reflections. You can experience the Catholic Faith in a whole new way by journeying through Lent with Dr. Tim Gray. Visit lent.formed.org to sign up.

We are planning to do a parish wide Lenten study through FORMED. This particular study is called: Into the Desert. It is a six-week study with each episode lasting about 30 minutes. 








#### PRE SCHOOL & PRE KINDERGARTEN

# A Note from our Parish Manager

In several past newsletter articles I've discussed about breaking everything down into four major categories. I). Operations – the overall running of our Parishes day to day, scheduling: 2). Fi-

Accounting – budgeting, systems, account management, reporting, processes: 3). Audit/Compliance/Controls – committee bylaws, cash management, processes: 4). Strategic & Long Term Planning – three to five year plan looking forward.

Most of what I've discussed in past articles has been about items that cross all three linked parishes. Many items between the three linked parishes that are the same can be shared in order to increase efficiencies, such as the Ministry Scheduler Pro application that we implemented last year and is now

in use at all three parishes. There are other items say for example cash controls for Sunday collection, these controls don't all need to be exactly the same for each parish as long as they meet guidelines for what is deemed necessary to be considered an effective control, which in turn is protection for our staffs, volunteers and parish.

Here is how I use and look at efficiencies in my position. So we currently have scrip programs at all three parishes, when I look at the policies and procedures at each individual parish to manage the scrip programs, during review of each parish program I might identify items at one parish that could be a benefit for one or both of the other parishes and help them improve the running of their program. This allows us to make changes to each program without having to rewrite policies and procedures entirely from scratch.

Over the next several newsletters, I'm going to take the four major categories from above and explain to you how in each of these four areas we've made some progress and improvements on different items and how each parish either has or will see some benefit.

#### Results of Dave Ramsey's FINANCIAL PEACE UNIVERSITY Class, Fall 2018

We concluded our last class of Financial Peace University (FPU) last October. Jason Rainey and Greg Kissel were honored to have 14 people attend the first FPU offered with our joint parishes. FPU is a nine week program that discusses our relationship with money and how it impacts our lives, both positively and negatively. Many subjects were presented, including budgeting, debt, purchasing and paying for our home, and planning for our futures, to name a few.

The program was very well received and we wanted to let our parishioners know what the participants got out of the program. Here are several comments that our graduates made on the last class of FPU.

"The class taught us a lot about how we should try to plan our future. The tools we learned have helped us feel better about where we are going and future expenses. We want to pay cash for big purchases from now on."

"This class has impacted our lives and we have made a 180 degree switch into a better direction. No more will we ever go into debt again. We will always budget and cash flow any expense thrown at us. We are now more secure and peaceful with our financial situation and feel we are stepping into a positive direction thanks to FPU."

"This class helped us stick to a budget for the first time. We had previously read "The Total Money Makeover", but weren't actively working the baby steps. I feel like we have concrete plans for our money for the first time."

"This class has really helped me feel comfortable about money in a long time. I always got the worst pit in my stomach anytime I wanted to bring it up with my husband. This is not the case anymore. I look forward to our financial future now when before feared it."

For me, being a college student about to start in the "real world", it has given me a much deeper understanding of how to prepare and where to put my money to be successful in the future. It has taught me the importance of budgeting and the order to build wealth. I am looking forward to applying these concepts to my future."

"This class made us more aware of our spending habits and given us some ideas for saving in the future. The biggest take-away from this class was how to go about buying a house. We learned it may be a good idea to rent and continue saving for a larger down-payment."

We are so proud of our FPU graduates and thank them for having the faith to turn their financial lives around and make their futures even stronger. It also was inspiring to see our couples growing together in their financial and marital lives.

# BROTHER JOEL BLAIZE



Brother Joel Blaize and three classmates professed their solemn vows as Benedictine monks of Saint Meinrad Archabbey in a ceremony on January 25, 2019.

The tonsure was an ancient practice of cutting one's hair to indicate that one was a monk. At Saint Meinrad, the practice takes place at two times: for entrance into the novitiate and for solemn vows. It is a visible sign that one has decided to embrace a new and different way of life. Monks wHo are also priests use the title "Father," while those who are not ordained go by "Brother."

Saint Meinrad

"A vow chart is a contract a monk makes with the monastery stating that he will abide by the vows of stability, obedience and fidelity to the monastic way of life. A vow chart shows up three times in a monk's life. It is created when he makes his first profession. These vows are for three years and is considered an official member of the community from the moment the chart is signed. Three years later, the monk will sign a new chart when he professes those same vows for the rest of his life. The charts are then taken to the archives and preserved until the death of the monk. The chart will be placed on the casket during the visitation and the Office of the Dead." (Excerpts from Vow Charts: A Hidden Treasure)


# Thoughts from Father Ambrose


#### **RACISM**

The US Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) approved a formal statement on racism: Open Wide Our Hearts: A Pastoral Letter Against Racism. Racism is a belief, either consciously or unconsciously, that a person holds that his or her race or ethnicity is superior and therefore judges persons as inferior and unworthy of equal regard. This conviction or a

attitude leads individuals or groups to exclude, ridicule, mistreat or unjustly discriminate against persons on the basis of their race or ethnicity. Our bishops say that this is sinful.

Racist acts are sinful because they violate justice. They reveal a failure to acknowledge the human dignity of the persons offended, to recognize them as the neighbors. Christ calls us






Racism can also come in the form of sin of omission, where individuals, or even churches, remain silent and fail to act against racial injustice when it is encountered. The bishops note that racism can often be found in our hearts, in many cases placed there unwillingly or unknowingly by our upbringing and culture. It can lead to thoughts and actions that we do not even see as racist, but nonetheless flow from the same prejudicial root.

Consciously or subconsciously, this attitude of superiority can be seen in how certain groups of people are called criminals, or are perceived as being unable to contribute to society thus unworthy of its benefits. Racism can also be institutional, when traditions are upheld that treat certain groups of people unjustly. The direct result of cumulative sins of racism have led to social structures of injustice and violence that makes us all accomplices of racism.

Some may believe that racism is no longer a major affliction of our society, since there has been positive changes from Civil Rights movements and related Civil Rights legislation. That racism is only found in the hearts of individuals, which could be dismissed as ignorant or unenlightened. Unfortunately, racism still profoundly affects our culture, and it has no place in the Christian heart. The evil causes great harm to its victims, and it corrupts the souls of those who harbor racist or prejudicial thoughts.

The bishops call for a genuine conversion of heart, a conversion that will compel change, and the reform of our institutions and society. Pope Francis often emphasizes, let no one think that this invitation is not meant for him or her; all of us are in need of personal ongoing conversion. To do justice requires an honest acknowledgement of our failures, "If we acknowledge our sins, God is faithful and just and will forgive our sins and cleanse us from every wrongdoing," (I Jn 1:9).

St. Augustine says that, after the fall from the Garden of Eden, our relationships with one another have been guided by a lust to dominate. Whether recognized or not, the history of injustices done to so many, because of their race, flows form this lust to dominate the other. The catechism points out that even when we are free from original sin by Baptism, we continue to struggle with overcoming temptation and sin in our lives.



# HOW TO GO TO CONFESSION

#### **Prayer Before Confession**

Come Holy Spirit into my soul. Enlighten my mind that I may know the sins I ought to confess, and grant me your grace to confess them fully, humbly, and with a contrite heart. Help me to firmly resolve not to commit them again. O Blessed Virgin, Mother of my Redeemer, intercede for me through the Passion of Your Son, that I may obtain the grace to make a good confession. Amen.

#### **Rite of Reconciliation**

Priest: In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Penitent: Bless me Father, for I have sinned. It has been (how long?) since my last confession, and these are my sins: (confess your sins).

**Priest:** (gives you a penance)

**Penitent:** (Pray the Act of Contrition): **Priest:** (gives you absolution for your sins)

**Penitent:** (recite or do your penance as soon as possible)

#### **Examination of Conscience for a Good Confession**

- I. I AM THE LORD YOUR GOD: YOU SHALL NOT HAVE STRANGE GODS BEFORE ME. Did I fail to love God, to make God first in my life, to thank Him, trust Him, love Him as He deserves? Did I fail to pray? Have I doubted or denied my faith? Was I careless in saying my prayers? Do I give God time everyday in prayer? Have I been involved in Ouija boards, Tarot cards, and the occult?
- **2. YOU SHALL NOT TAKE THE NAME OF THE LORD YOUR GOD IN VAIN.** Did I curse or swear? Did I use God's Name in vain, lightly, carelessly, by blasphemy? Have I used foul language or jokes?
- 3. **REMEMBER TO KEEP HOLY THE SABBATH.** Have I deliberately missed Mass on Sundays or Holy Days of Obligation? Did I leave Mass early without a good reason? Did I receive Holy Communion in the state of serious sin? In any of my previous confessions, did I lie to or deliberately conceal something from the priest? Did I do unnecessary work on Sunday?
- **4. HONOR YOUR FATHER AND YOUR MOTHER.** Did I honor and obey my parents? Have I respected my brothers and sisters? Have I respected those with lawful authority, including teachers, bosses and civil authorities? Have I talked back? Did I fail to help at home or to spend time with my family?
- **5. YOU SHALL NOT KILL.** Did I give in to feelings of anger or jealousy? Did I keep hatred in my heart? Did I fight, give a bad example or cause scandal? Have I abused alcohol or drugs? Have I had or in any way permitted or encouraged abortion? Have I thought about suicide? Do I avoid gluttony?
- **6. YOU SHALL NOT COMMIT ADULTERY.** Did I consent to impure glances? Sinful touches? Was I immodest in dress or behavior? Did I look at pornography, impure books, magazines, or videos? Am I guilty of masturbation? Have I engaged in premarital sex, or adultery? Have I used artificial contraception such as pills or devices? Do I live chastely according to my state in life (married, single, religious and ordained)? Do I avoid occasions of impurity?
- **7. YOU SHALL NOT STEAL.** Have I stolen what is not mine? What or how much? Did I return it or make up for what I have stolen? Have I cheated on tests, homework or taxes? Did I waste time at work? Have I avoided laziness, idleness?
- **8. YOU SHALL NOT BEAR FALSE WITNESS AGAINST YOUR NEIGHBOR.** Have I lied or gossiped? Have I talked about another behind his back? Do I always tell the truth? Am I sincere? Did I reveal secrets that should have been kept confidential? Am I critical, negative or uncharitable in my talk?
- **9. YOU SHALL NOT COVET YOUR NEIGHBOR'S WIFE.** Have I consented to impure thoughts? Have I encouraged them by stares, curiosity or impure conversations? Did I neglect to control my imagination or desire other people?
- **10. YOU SHALL NOT COVET YOUR NEIGHBOR'S GOODS.** Is my heart greedy? Am I jealous of what another has? Am I envious of others because I don't have what they have? Am I moody or gloomy? Do I work, study, and keep busy to counter idle thoughts? Am I critical, negative or uncharitable in my thoughts of others? Is my heart set on earthly possessions or on the treasures of Heaven?

#### Divine Mercy Sunday, April 28 - Holy Cross—3 pm—Service

Divine Mercy Sunday will be celebrated on April 28 at 3:00 pm at Holy Cross. You may receive special graces when you take part in the prayers and devotions held in honor of Divine Mercy.

Divine Mercy was revealed through Christ to St. Faustina in 1935. Calling her the Apostle and Secretary of His mercy, He ordered her to begin writing a diary so others would learn to trust in Him. In a series of revelations, He taught her that His mercy is unlimited and available even to the greatest sinners, and He revealed special ways for people to respond to His mercy.

Urging St. Faustina to pray the Divine Mercy Chaplet often, Jesus told her: "My daughter, encourage souls to say the chaplet which I have given you. It pleases Me to grant everything they ask of Me by saying the chaplet. By saying the chaplet you are bringing humankind closer to me".

Please join us at 3:00 pm on Sunday, April 28 for this beautiful service.

Jesus told St. Faustina that this Feast of Mercy would be a very special day when "all the divine floodgates through which graces flow are opened."


