Dear Friends,

I hope this finds you doing well. Several Sundays back, we heard Jesus speak to us about the vine and the branches. He said, "I am the vine, you are the branches. Whoever remains in me and I in him will bear much fruit, because without me you can do nothing." This got me thinking about life as a Catholic Christian.

We must stay connected to the vine to have life and bear fruit. We know this is true for a grape vine. If a branch becomes disconnected from the vine, it withers and dies. The same is true in our lives of faith. We can only bear fruit when we are connected to the vine.

Let's get back to a little Catholicism 101, the basics. How do we stay connected to the vine (Jesus)? We do this by receiving grace. There's that word we use a lot – GRACE. Do you know what it means? Grace literally means "God's LIFE." So, when we receive grace through the sacraments, the life of Christ flows through us and allows us to bear fruit. Of course, this begins in the Sacrament of Baptism when we are initiated into the life of grace. This continues on when we are nourished with the Holy Eucharist, and this grace is strengthened in the Sacrament of Confirmation. This is how we stay connected to the vine and bear fruit. And when we get weak, like an injured branch on the vine, God has given us the Sacrament of Reconciliation (Confession) to reunite us with the vine. This allows the life of Christ to fully flow through us again. How fortunate we are to have these sacraments throughout our lives.

I share all of this because this is the reason why parishes exist. And that is why God has given us priests – to bring us the grace of the sacraments. True, we do a lot of other important things in our parishes, but we must realize the most important work that happens in a Catholic parish is the celebration of the sacraments – receiving the grace (God's life) to transform us and allow the Lord to do His work through us. This is how we "remain" in Jesus and produce good fruit.

We just celebrated First Holy Communion with our children and this reminds us how important it is that we make sure our children stay connected to Christ in the Holy Eucharist. If we want our children to grow in God's grace and please Him with their lives, we have to make sure they stay connected to the sacramental life of the Church. In my 20 years of the priesthood, I have observed one thing clearly – when people stay connected to the sacraments, especially Confession and Holy Communion, their lives are so much more peaceful and fruitful. This is particularly true when it comes to marriages. If people are staying close to the sacraments, the possibilities of them having successful marriages are incredibly high. However, when people fall away from the sacraments and God's grace, there are many more potential struggles. This goes back to what Jesus told us: "Anyone who does not remain in me will be thrown out like a branch and wither." It's true. Everything in our life – here and now – and eternally – depends on our link with Christ. We must stay connected to the VINE to have life.

Jesus is the vine and we are His branches. Let us stay united with our Lord in His sacraments and He will work through us to produce much good fruit. Have a "fruitful" summer!






#### Fourth Grade

### FATHER AMBROSE'S WORDS

#### On Caring for our Common Home

The Fourth Sunday of Easter is Earth day; the Catholic church has consistently spoken about the importance of pursuing environmental solutions that are beneficial to all people. Pope Francis indicates that the planet is beginning to look like a polluted wasteland, and now creatures and people often the poor are bearing the consequences.

In 2016, the global energy sector emitted 32.1 gigatonnes of Carbon dioxide. This number has been relatively stable with slight increase. Currently our technologies cannot provide the 7.5 billion people on the planet with carbon free-energy. So much of the world's population lives in poverty, and for carbon-free energy to supply the planet it must be affordable as its carbon alternatives.



As politics is divisive and partisan as it seems, it goes beyond a particular party or even a particular nation to realize that the power of the Paris agreement lies in the fact that it expresses a universal and united political desire to work together. It is an example of international solidarity, a symbol of global solidarity and unity towards the good.

I realize some people struggle with putting it as a priority taking care of our common home; some tend to think it is secondary to protecting the unborn. In Laudato Si, pope Francis states that since everything is interrelated, concern for the protection of the nature is not opposed in character as to be incapable of existing together with the justification for being pro-life. In fact, if one is truly pro-life, then one will find it easy to be a good steward of nature.

Showing Mercy to the earth as our common home and cherishing the world in which we live in as a place for sharing and communion, is a call and expectation of each Christian. Pope Francis declared that the care of our common home is itself to be recognized as a work of Mercy.

When one considers the traditional seven corporal and seven spiritual works of Mercy it becomes clear that the object of mercy is human life itself and everything it embraces. The care of our common home is an act of mercy toward the poor, the unborn, future generations and all of creation. Participation in his new work of mercy begins in and is strengthened by God's own mercy towards humankind. "We love because he first loved us" (I Jn 4:19) and when this first love is rejected, humans are turning against God's own design for creation.

Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew said that "to commit a crime against the natural world is a sin against ourselves and a sin against God." We are to make it a habit through daily gestures, doing away with exploitation and selfishness. Viewing God's presence in the creation. Every effort must be made to address the structural causes of the deep scars that humanity continues to inflict on the earth and that contribute greatly to the suffering of the poor.

Energy in its many forms is a gift of God, made freely available to the whole humanity, and not for excessive use of a privileged few. It is good too to remember those who labor in the energy industries and technologies, especially those whose dignity is not upheld, that it may be respected.

Human beings play a critical role in caring for the environment as stewards, in his encyclical Laudato si, Pope Francis reminds us of the old testament mandate that tell us to till and keep the garden of the world (Gen 2:15) where keeping means caring, protecting overseeing and preserving. Taking appropriate actions to promote clean air and clean water for everyone.

It is true that Fossil fuel –fired power plants are the largest pollution emitting sector, they make up just under one third of US total green greenhouse emissions. The clean power plan, which is a national program designed to reduce Carbon emissions for the power plants by 32%, thus striving to meet domestic and international mitigation standards is a good thing. Many states have already made progress towards Carbon mitigation goals under clan power plan,St. Francis of Assis love and compassion for the poor and the creation is a model for all people of good will. Let us say yes to being good stewards.

# Update from the desk of Coordinator of Parish Operations.



Continued from my update in the February newsletter where I discussed taking all of the information I'd gathered since starting in this position in August and breaking it down into several major categories, with each category having multiple sub-categories within them. I've worked through each category and sub-category to better understand how we could make changes to improve in areas such as operations, scheduling systems, accounting/finance, process, committee bylaws to name a few and how that would either benefit Father Tony or our staffs at one or all three parishes. It could be something as simple as changing how a meeting is conducted that would save time by being more productive for everyone attending, which would be an efficiency, or something more involved such as installing Ministry Scheduler Pro software at all three parishes to run and schedule our Liturgical/Ministries, which is an efficiency for staff, while also being helpful to our many volunteers, but could

take longer to implement. The four major categories in no particular order are: 1). Operations - overall running of our Parishes day to day, scheduling, 2): Finance/Accounting – budgeting, systems, account management, reporting, processes, 3). Audit/Compliance/Controls – committee bylaws, cash management, processes, 4). Strategic & Long Term Planning – three to five year plan looking forward. Over the next several newsletters I plan to explain what we'll be looking at in each of these major categories and working with parish committees, staffs, and Father Tony to develop a plan to implement changes that will be a benefit for Father Tony, our parish staffs and our parishes as a whole going forward. Create and donate quilts for our church fundraisers





# Jesus is Risen – The Joy of Easter by Gerald Weber RCIA

The Easter Vigil this year was celebrated at Holy Cross. It was a little wet and windy but it was still a time of great joy and celebration in our Catholic Church. (It is 1943 in Holland, occupied by the Nazis. The Christian ten Boom family has been hiding Jews. They ask a visiting pastor — "Would you be willing to take a Jewish mother and her baby into your home?") — "Color drained from the man's face. He took a step back from me. 'Miss ten Boom! I do hope you're not involved with any of this illegal concealment ... It's just not safe! Think of your father!' I pulled the coverlet back from the baby's face. The man bent forward, his hand in spite of himself reaching for the tiny fist curled round the blanket. For a moment I saw compassion and fear struggle in his face. Then he straightened. 'No. Definitely not. We could lose our lives for that Jewish child!' Unseen by either of us, Father had appeared in the doorway. 'Give the child to me, Corrie,' he said. Father held the baby close, his white beard brushing its cheek, looking into the little face with eyes as blue and innocent as the baby's .. 'You say we could lose our lives for this child. I would consider that the greatest honor that could come to my family.' The Hiding Place by Corrie ten Boom (paperback book available in any bookstore for about \$8)


