Dear Friends,

I hope all of you have enjoyed the summer. It's time to get back to school! The Catholic School's Office always has a theme for the new school year. This year's theme is, *Christ*, *the Cornerstone of Catholic Schools*. This reminds us that Christ is the reason for our schools. We are very blessed to have Catholic schools in each of our three parishes. All three of our schools are experiencing growth in numbers this year, which means the future is bright in our parishes.

Several weeks ago I was asked to give a presentation to the principals of the Catholic schools in our diocese. My main topic was centered on the theme of the year – Christ, the Cornerstone. We reflected on the great blessing of having Catholic schools and how fortunate we are to share our faith in the classroom each day. The principals shared different ways in which their schools can transmit the faith to our young people. As we discussed this, the conversation kept going back to the importance of our families. While we all agree that Catholic schools are a huge part of our parishes, the first and most important "schools" are the homes of our children.

Let me share something really interesting I recently read. There was a study done which attempted to identify the leading factors why teens continue the practice of the faith into their adult life. The study listed about twenty factors. Look at the top four:

- #4 regularly praying together as a family;
- #3 engaging in acts of service together as a family;
- #2 children speaking with their fathers about faith and values; and
- #I children speaking with their mothers about faith and values.



Isn't that interesting. The top four factors that most effectively contribute to children being formed in the faith and remaining in the faith have to do with family life. This is why our Church has always and will always teach that parents are first and foremost in shaping their children's faith lives. So, as important as our Catholic schools and Religious Education programs are, our parents and our family lives are most critical when it comes to being formed in the faith. May we never forget this or take for granted the significance of our families. I challenge all of our families to consider if they are meeting those top four criteria. We all want our children to grow up and become faithful Christians to transform this world. The most effective way to do this is clear – make Christ the Cornerstone of your home and family.

As we begin this new academic year, please join me in praying for all those who are involved in the education and formation of our youth, especially all parents, that they will be great teachers and models by the way in which they live their lives. May this truly be a blessed year filled with God's grace and peace.

MASS INTENTION POLICY

According to Church (Canon) Law, each Mass is to be offered for a **single** intention. A single intention may include the following:

- Husband & Wife
- Parent & Child
- An Individual intention for the family such as "The (name) Family" if you have multiple deceased family members
- An individual organization such as "Deceased Members of Knights of St. John"

We must limit to 3 intentions per year (one weekend & 2 weekday). We can send extra Mass intentions to other parishes, retired priests, or to missions. Monetary donations received at funerals—We can retain up to 10 Mass intentions at our parish.

Additional money received for Masses can either be kept by the family for future intentions or sent away to other priests as listed above.

Any donations received at funerals that are NOT designated for Masses can be applied as a memorial gift to the parish.

HOME COMMUNION

Eucharistic Ministers take Communion to the homebound on Friday mornings. If you have had a recent surgery, a hospital stay, or are unable to attend Mass and would like to receive Communion, please contact the parish office by Thursday afternoon.

BAPTISM PREP CLASS

All first time parents must attend a Baptismal Class prior to their baby being baptized. Godparents are welcome to attend also. You are encouraged to attend this class before the baby is born. Next class dates will be on September 14, 2015, & December 14, 2015.

SUCCESS AND FAILURE

Time just keeps going; it doesn't wait for anyone. While we are enjoying the achievements of last scholastic year through the summer, the time for new scholastic year is already at hand. Parents are in hurry to prepare children to send to schools and in turn children are also getting ready to go to school. I just asked a few children, "Are you ready to come to school? "The answers were: not really, kind of, we want few more holidays, no-not at all. Then I just told them ask Fr. Tony to extend the holidays. They just laughed. Anyhow, time doesn't wait for anyone. We need to do things on time. I thought it would be good to share some of my collections with you as you plan and set new goals for this scholastic year.



There is an old proverb, "Well began is half done." It was actually referred to as a proverb by Aristotle, who died 322 B.C. The mistake lies in the beginning; as the proverb says, 'Well begun is half done;' so an error at the beginning, though quite small, bears the same ratio to the errors in the other parts. In other words, if you do something well at the beginning, you are halfway to a successful completion. However, there is also Korean old saying that 'If you stop in the middle, it is no better than not doing it.' This does not give any meaning in beginning, but the meaning appear when we totally finish and reach the end. It says if we determined to attempt, we should be responsible till the end comes out. Thomas Edison tried two thousand different materials in search of a filament for the light bulb. When none worked satisfactorily, his assistant complained, "All our work is in vain. We have learned nothing."Thomas Edison replied very confidently, "Oh, we have come a long way and we have learned a lot. We now know that there are two thousand elements which we cannot use to make a good light bulb."

If you learn from your mistakes then you are intelligent. But if you learn from someone's mistakes, then you are a Genius. Success is nothing more than a few simple disciplines practiced daily and failure is nothing more than a small few errors repeated daily.

How true the above lines are! Success or failure takes root in our minds. When we don't practice discipline in life, we don't build enough confidence to attempt new and challenging tasks which are important and matters in life. Our confidence depends on what we think of ourselves and whether we believe in ourselves. We are all born with exceptional qualities, but only a few really realize their true potentials and the others just lead an average life.

Success is a fruit which everyone wants to eat but it is not found everywhere and no one can achieve it without serious efforts. CHURCH RENOVATION RECAP By Steve Hall

Now that the Church Renovation project is complete, it is worthwhile to recap the entire project. Few people realize the extent of items that were accomplished in almost every aspect of the church building. The table below lists all the items that were completed.

The project is completely paid for thanks to the extreme generosity of Holy Cross Parishioners. Total cost of the project was \$314,177.80. \$301,802.07 was received from 173 Parishioner families (100% of all pledges were fully paid – amazing!); \$5,250 was received from non-Parishioners; Journeymen donated \$1000. Additionally, pew sales have brought in \$6,500, and there was a \$30 refund from Wal-Mart. Total income was \$314,582.07.

A huge THANK YOU to all parishioners who unselfishly donated countless hours of their time, their amazing talents, and financial resources to ensure a completely successful project!

ST. MARIA GORETTI YOUTH NEWS By: Bryan Macke

For this newsletter edition I'm going to focus on two events from this summer. Both capture this main point in our SMG mission statement: "Spiritual, service and social events are offered to help the youth within our Catholic community strengthen their relationship with Christ and His Church."

From July 1st thru the 3rd we put on our first retreat. It was a retreat for HS boys held on the tranquil grounds at St. Bernard. We had 10 boys attend, and many adult men that volunteered to share their time and love. It went so well that before it was over the boys were already planning to do it again next summer! To keep the retreat a special experience for those that attend, which is common for all retreats that I know of, I won't go into all the details about it.



But I'd love to give you an idea of what took place, and how it affected these young men.

First, this was not a typical retreat, but the boys definitely "retreated" from their normal busy lives to spend time with the Lord and each other. Abe Kiesel, who attended the retreat said, "the retreat was a great little get away from the busy summer. We grew closer to God and each other while having a really good time." We tried to keep in mind to have a variety of spiritual, service and social activities throughout the retreat. We had a pretty jammed packed schedule full of crazy games, service projects for our local community, and spiritual exercises such as Mass, guest speakers, and faith sharing. We played "water volleyball," which is basically just a normal game of outdoor volleyball. The twist is that during the game there is an adult with a hose, spraying whoever is hitting the ball! It was quite refreshing with the hot sun beaming down. We grilled burgers and brats for both suppers (thank you Dewig Meats for your donation!) The boys made one breakfast on their own which was really good despite what some might think about teenage boys in the kitchen.;) We helped two local elderly folks with yard work, such as pulling weeds, putting down weed block and mulch. Right when we were about to be at the first house it started to pour down....for a second we considered waiting or going to an indoor job, but recalling this was a young "men's" retreat we decided to "man-up" and just go for it. If any neighbors saw us they probably thought we were nuts (which may not be completely incorrect). One of the best parts in my opinion was a bit of silent time set aside for introspection and just to be with the Lord (can't really say much more than that). Overall, it was a great 48 hours, comprehensive to our youth ministry's mission, filling these boys with good fun, good fellowship, and time to deepen their relationship with the Good Lord!

From July 12 – 17 a group of 14 youth and 6 adults journeyed to Toppa Joppa (literally on top of Joppa Mountain) in the impoverished region northeastern TN. We joined Glenmary Home Missioners in helping the people there with home repairs and to share in the love of God with each other! In the picture, Lindsey Field and Morgan Reed (left to right), helped install windows for a lady in extreme need of home repairs. Her home was without water plumbing, electric, and windows (yet with openings to the elements). It was truly a difficult situation to even imagine, especially here in America.



SMG YOUTH CONTINUED.....

Our entire group (adults included) gained a much deeper appreciation for the simple things in life. Every night we reflected on our experiences, and the recurring theme was appreciation of the little things. Not just indoor plumbing, windows and electricity, but also parents that love and support us, the value of home chores, reaching out to someone in need, etc. Other jobs included sealing a wood siding home and various types of work for a local children's group home called Kingswood (also a school). At Kingswood, we sorted a massive amount of donations, provided grounds keeping tasks, and took time to just get to know and share Christ's love with the youth that live there. On Kingswood's website it states: "Kingswood is a place of healing. Needy, displaced, troubled and abandoned children come to Kingswood and find shelter. It provides children a Christian home-like environment where every effort is made to develop in each child a personal faith in God, in himself, and in his fellowman." It was a powerful experience to be with the kids there. The darkness of this world and the light of Christ were both evident. I believe experiences like this help fan the flame of hope and love in our hearts, strengthening our wills to reach out to others and giving us purpose in our lives. There was a local college student volunteering there as well for the entire summer. At the end of the week, in a conversation with him, he told me that his dad was in rehab for the past year and a half for manufacturing, selling, and using drugs. He said that's why he was at Kingswood, to help kids that have gone through similar difficulties and troubled pasts. Ultimately, we were there for the same reason, to be witnesses of Christ's light to the world. "Religion that is pure and undefiled before God and the Father is this: to care for orphans and widows in their affliction and to keep oneself unstained by the world." James 1:27

Our mission to Toppa Joppa was an awesome experience for our youth, and for our adult volunteers. (pictured is the group of young adults) This would not have been possible without your help! Thank you all so much that supported us with your gifts of prayer and donations. I truly believe lives were changed, both the people we served and our group of volunteers. The gifts of our time, talent and treasure are precious resources, not created by us, but given to us by our loving Father, who asks us as stewards to use them wisely and generously in bringing others to Him. Sharing a portion of our time, talent and treasure is a way to share Jesus Christ, our ultimate gift, with those who do not know Him. (The Call to Stewardship – CDOW)

Stewardship of time - Giving Time to God - investing in our prayer life:

God has given each of us the gift of time – 24 hours in a day, 168 hours in a week, 730 hours in a month and 8,760 hours in a year. How are we using this time to serve God?

Are we maintaining a proper balance of time for God, family, work, church and self? Have you considered that our use of our time should be to refresh ourselves so that we are able to serve better?

It is good to periodically ask ourselves the question, "How is this use of time helping me grow holy?"

Spend 10 minutes in prayer, read daily readings (USCCB), learn about the saints.

Stewardship of talent-Sharing our Talent- participating in the life of our parish and community:

When we hear talent we usually think about the talents that we have to share. Have you considered that good stewards also cultivate the talents of others? Sometimes it takes a personal invitation.

Before we can share our talents we must recognize and receive them.

Ask the Lord which of the talents he has given you and how does he want you to use them today.

Stewardship of treasure - Offering our Treasure - is a faith response:

A gift from the heart. It is out of our need to give not giving to a need.

All of us have different levels of material resources, but we are called to return in thanksgiving a proportionate gift, each in a measure we have been blessed with.

Donate a dish to the Bereavement team, make a meal for someone in need, buy Scrip cards, donate clothes or other materials to a worthy person or cause.

Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA)

The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults is a process designed to form and inform inquirers who fall into three categories:

- I. The un-baptized person
- 2. The person baptized into a faith tradition other than Catholic
- 3. The baptized Catholic who was neither confirmed nor reared as a Catholic.

The climax of the process comes when those who choose to do so are confirmed and baptized (if necessary) in the Catholic Church.

Each inquirer chooses a sponsor. This sponsor is not to be confused with a baptismal or confirmation sponsor. The RCIA sponsor is a practicing Catholic, usually a member of this parish, who goes through the sessions and rites (ceremonies) of the process with the inquirer, serving as a friend and mentor.

The RCIA is not a program or a class, but a sacramental formation process that prepares individuals and communities for a particular way of life as Catholic Christians. Conversion is at the heart of that way of life. Conversion is a turning around, an about-face; it is the change that happens when we allow God to love us enough that God reforms us.

Conversion is a continuing process throughout our lives. If you know of someone who would like to join the church or is just wanting to know more about their Catholic Faith, please have them contact our office for more information. We are all called to Evangelize, is there someone that is waiting for that personal invitation...maybe your personal invitation?

The Cursillo Movement, approaches evangelization as a very natural act of being Christlike within each of our daily activities. While most people would like to live their lives in a Christ-like manner, the pressures of the world often make this difficult. The Cursillo Movement provides a method and a technique to provide each of us with the tools, the mentality, the strength, and the support to make this natural type of evangelization possible. The Cursillo Movement can assist each of us in developing a deeper understanding of what it means to be fully Catholic by being fully Christian. NATURAL FAMILY PLANNING

Lori and I have decided to let couples share their experiences with NFP. We feel this is a powerful way to promote the Church's teachings. Each quarter we will share a couple's story. I still remember the tears of joy that rolled down my face on the day of our wedding as my husband, Christopher, and I stated our vows to one another. One of the things that we said "I will" to was the question, "Will you accept children lovingly from God, and bring them up according to the law of Christ and his Church?" One of the reasons this particular vow really meant a lot to me was that I knew that night when my husband and I made love for the first time, we were going to be in our peak fertile time of the month and there was a chance we may get pregnant.



During the months leading up to our wedding, we had spent time in marriage preparation learning about Natural Family Planning. It didn't take too long for us to decide this was the family planning method we were going to use. We realized that if this was the family planning method that the Church supported, then we knew it was the one that would bring us the most happiness, help foster the strongest marriage possible, and lead to the most fulfilling sex life.

When our wedding was a few weeks away, I was getting very comfortable charting my fertility signs. Then one night I decided to project out toward our wedding night and see what part of our fertility cycle we would be in. I was a bit shocked when I realized my peak fertile time would start on the day of our wedding and last a good portion of the honeymoon! Christopher and I then realized we were going to have to make

the decision whether we were going to be open to life on the night of our wedding or postpone uniting together for a few days. We prayed about it in adoration together. Later on that evening, Christopher told me that he felt like God was telling him, "Trust in Me! How much more obvious of a sign do you want me to give you?!"

I felt a weight lifted off my shoulders knowing that we were going to put our fertility in God's hands on our wedding night. It turns out, it was not in God's plan for us to conceive a child that month, but we remained open to life and Conceived a few months later and now have a beautiful 8 month old daughter. That discernment leading up to our wedding prepared us for the lifetime of discernment that we will get to do as a cou-



ple every month when we will have to take to prayer whether God is calling us to be open to life that month or not.


?!What is all this about <u>Planned Parenthood</u>, abortion, and their sale of body parts?!
