



## Fr. Ambrose's Thoughts

#### BEING PRO LIFE

Pope St. John Paul II, in his encyclical letter: Humane Vitae he clearly identifies threats to human life such as: Poverty, hunger, diseases, violence and war. The pope reflecting on the spirit of Vatican II condemned attacks against human life; whatever is opposed to life itself, whatever insults human dignity. It all starts at conception, and goes to natural death. The unborn or the dying, are completely at the mercy of others, they depend on them; they can only communicate through silent language.



In this article we look into human trafficking, it is an evil crime on an international scale, it is termed as modern form of slavery. I have read experiences of people, how they could single behaviors from people on board, on flight, weird behaviors, signs of human trafficking, someone controlling what the other person should say, like not allowing the person to speak for themselves, avoiding eye contact, fearful, anxious, tense, dressed inappropriately.

You may remember the headlines about the Yazidi Women and girls who were abducted in Sinjar (Iraq) in August 2014. These women were trafficked to Syria, subjected to forced conversion, forced marriage, sexual abuse, physical and mental abuse, forced labor. One of them was this year's 2018 Nobel prize winner: Nadia Murad, she was held captive by ISIS before escaping., she now lives in Germany, she travels telling her story, her experiences.

No country is immune to human trafficking; it is a business with billions of dollars UNICEF, estimates that 21 million people have been trafficked around the world, including 5.5 million children. The primary victims are women and girls, women constitute 51%, girls: 20%, men 21%, Boys 8%. Those involved in human trafficking thrive in regions that are not stable, those countries experiencing war and conflict. It's even more challenging with immigration crisis, especially among refugees, they are vulnerable to traffickers, they abuse their situation, traffickers prey on their desperation to find a safe place.

It's important for us to be mindful while addressing factors responsible for mass migration, be it armed conflicts, violence in general, hunger, poverty, natural disasters. Many of these innocent people lack safe pathways to safety, or in their attempts to search for opportunities.

A country like Libya, controlled with Militia groups; they kidnap people and ask for ransom from family members, a quick way of getting cash. Governance is at the center of these problem, bad politics and governments, not putting peace at the center, not caring for its people, resulting in failed states, gang groups, committing organized crimes.

The church calls for compassionate love, respect, hospitality, friendship, solidarity while dealing with migrants and victims of human trafficking. By doing so we are practicing being pro-life. Jesus says: "That all may have life and have it to the full" (Jn 10:10). The Catholic church recognizes the inherent God-given dignity of equal and inalienable rights of all human persons as the foundation of freedom, justice and peace.

The church is active across the world; welcoming victims of human trafficking especially religious sisters do a great work in this regard. Victims of trafficking, those hidden within migrant communities, the church becomes a place they trust and go to, with hope of getting help, this trust is essential. Then other leaders get involved, the police and civil authorities.

Jesus declares: "I am the way and the truth and the life" (Jn 14:6). We who have said yes to him, we are invited to give life to others; we are to accept and fulfill completely the responsibility of loving and serving, of defending and promoting human life from Conception to natural death.



#### **NEW ENDOWMENT FOR HOLY CROSS PARISH**

Recently, we received word that a new endowment has been established for the benefit of Holy Cross Parish. Established at The Catholic Foundation of Southwestern Indiana, the fund is in honor of Bob and Alvina Reuber. The Reubers, now both deceased, were founding members of Holy Cross Parish. They were very active in the support of the new parish. Alvina was a member of the first choir that was established in 1947. Bob was among the first group of Parish Counselors that Fr. Murphy selected when the parish was organized. And they remained active at Holy Cross throughout their lives. Alvina helped with cooking at many Holy Cross events; and Bob helped at many of the necessary tasks to keep the parish operating. Their faith community was always an important part of their lives.

So it is very fitting that this endowment was established by their family in their honor as a way to provide financial support to their beloved parish in perpetuity. This named fund, **John R (Bob) and Alvina (Oing) Reuber Endowment**, is for "the general support of Holy Cross Parish". Their family created the endowment with an initial amount of \$5000. These initial funds will remain and grow year after year. And the yearly disbursements will be available to help Holy Cross throughout the future. Of course, ad-

We've had a great start to the new school year. High school RockLife on Sunday nights has started off great with packed houses. We've had between 40 and 50 youth per night. It's awesome to see the young church excited about following Jesus Christ, being a part of the Church community, and living their faith! After one of the nights, a youth that attended texted me, "I have a friend that wants to come to join RockLife. She's not Catholic but I told her I can try to take her every time because so far its helped me feel better about being accepted." That's exactly what we're looking for. The mission of RockLife is to meet youth where they're at, and bring them closer to Jesus Christ.

We typically meet every I<sup>st</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday evening from 6:00-8:00 in the youth room at Sts. Peter & Paul. We try to keep a healthy balance of spiritual and social activities. Our

average night includes a bit of everything: games, faith lesson, discussion, Sandy's Pizza, Scripture readings, videos, faith sharing talks, etc. This year is focused on Discipleship. That's a pretty general and all-encompassing theme! But it's also pretty basic and real ...just saying "yes" to God in your day to day. We will be using media by Chris Stefanick as well as having a variety of guest speakers. Please pray that through these efforts, our youth come to a deeper awareness of and relationship with our Lord Jesus Christ. For he's truly ALIVE!!



On Oct. 20<sup>th</sup> we had our annual Fall Freshtivities event at Matt & Amy Parmer's house. I 15 middle & high school youth attended. ## Update from the Desk of Coordinator of Parish Operations

Where did this past year go, it's hard to believe that we're already in the month of November and soon we will be at the end of another year.

Continued from the August newsletter article I'd like to share a few thoughts on several items that I've been working on that fall under category 3) Audit, Compliance & Controls – committee bylaws, cash management, processes.

First of all at some point in the near future the diocese is going to audit each of our linked parishes. They've already started this process within the diocese at other parishes. What does the word audit mean? An audit is a formal examination or inspection of an individual or organizations



financial accounts, reports, processes, controls and such, conducted by a third independent body. What does this mean for each of our three parishes? It means that the staff will work with the auditor to supply data requested from them ahead of time and to answer questions they may have during the audit process, and sometimes this includes interviews with staff. Several months after the audit is completed the auditor will send out a management report with recommendations to the Diocese, Pastor and staff for our review on items we might want to consider making changes or improvements to. An audit is not a bad thing it is a way for us to improve and become more efficient.

Some areas that I'm concentrating on and working with staff are controls we need put in place audit or no audit. Reviewing and updating council and committee bylaws, this is something we should be doing on an ongoing basis minimum of every three years. We have completed several bylaw reviews to date and made changes and or updates. We still have several more to complete. Reviewing and updating cash controls, for things such as counting cash and the deposit process for Sunday collections, same for fund raising events, and for normal everyday operations. Creating new cash controls around functions where none currently exist. Having these types of cash controls in place is for protection of the staff, volunteers, parish and the type of things we need in place to have our parish operations ran as efficient as possible.


