As many of you know, Holy Cross Church was built in 1956. That makes it 57 years old. Because it was so well built, we have had very few major maintenance costs. Having said that, there is a need for some renovation/renewal work in the church. To address these needs, the Parish Council has formed a committee to study these needs. The following are some of the items we are currently discussing:

> Refinishing the pews and kneelers Renovating the wall behind the altar Replacing the wooden doors Renovating the sacristy with new cabinets Thoroughly cleaning the terrazzo floor

We will keep everyone informed as we progress forward with this endeavor. Our goal is to have a fund drive in the Spring and begin the work soon thereafter.

I also wanted to mention a bit about the Diocesan Strategic Plan. You may have heard in the news that Bishop Thompson announced the first phase at the end of September. This first phase did not include any of our local parishes. We are not certain when Bishop Thompson will announce the changes in our parishes. However, he is scheduled to come on March 17<sup>th</sup> to meet with our parishes and discuss the future. Please plan to attend. We will share more details regarding the place and time of this meeting as it draws near.

I pray that you will find many blessings in the upcoming seasons of Thanksgiving, Advent and Christmas. We have so much for which to be grateful, especially the gift of our faith.


time a new bulletin is posted to Seek And Find; just click the red envelope link above the bulletins.



# HOLY CROSS SCHOOL

Welcome back to another exciting school year at Holy Cross! As usual, things are going very well, and we continue to hold steady. Our enrollment for grades K-5 is at 94. This includes 4 voucher students and 23 choice scholarship students. Our largest class is grade 5 which has 20 students enrolled. Preschool and pre-kindergarten has an enrollment

of 58 students. Once again, our I-STEP scores were outstanding. The students scored 94.1% in Math and 96.1% in Language Arts. These accomplishments are not to be taken for granted. The hard work of our students, teachers, and parents continues to be a trademark here at Holy Cross. We have created and adopted a new mission statement here at school. We feel the statement is very powerful and provides all parties involved with a focus which enables Holy Cross to remain a special place.

### The Sacred Altar of Sacrifice

An altar of sacrifice is always found in a prominent place in all of our Catholic churches. We see it as soon as we walk into a church. An altar of sacrifice has been in existence for thousands of years. What exactly is the significance of an altar of sacrifice?

To get a better grasp of what the altar of sacrifice truly is we must go back to our early roots which lie in our Judeo-Christian heritage. It is there that we begin looking in appreciation at Israel's notion of God. For the Israelites, God was unique, transcendent, all-powerful, supremely self-sufficient, and yet personal. Because God was personal, he called for a response on the part of his people. This response had to be correspondingly personal. Sacrifice, then, was the external expression of a personal response to a personal God. Thus, the altar came into use as a means of communication with God. It was a time when God and man personally came together.



Sacrifices in our early history were many and varied. Noah, for example, built an altar to the Lord, and choosing from every clean animal ... he offered holocausts on the altar (Gen. 8:20). Sacrifices were also, on occasion, requested by God. One such sacrifice is recorded in Exodus at which time God asks Moses to build an altar of sacrifice. An altar of earth you shall make for me, and upon it you shall sacrifice your holocausts and peace offerings, your sheep and your oxen. In whatever place I choose for the remembrance of my name. I will come to you and bless you.... (Exodus 24) All through Israelite history, altars were built, consecrated, and sacrifices, usually that of a lamb, were offered upon them. The altar was always very sacred to the Israelites. When an altar became desecrated in any way, it was a most horrifying experience for the people, and the altar was always rededicated.

Today we have the ultimate of all sacrifices, the Eucharistic, called *the Last* Supper or the Breaking of the Bread in the New Testament. Jesus is now the Lamb of God, replacing the lamb offered in sacrifice in Old Testament times. It is a proclamation of Jesus' atoning death. In the Eucharist, we are personally integrated into the death and the resurrection of Jesus.

As in the past, the altar today is consecrated and is used only for sacrifice, the Eucharistic meal. In reverence to the altar, we bow when we pass before it. It is the table of the Lord. It is also out of respect for the sacredness of the altar that at no time, even when the Eucharistic celebration is taking place, nothing is placed on the altar other than that which is used specifically for the Eucharistic celebration.

In Revelations we read, Here I stand knocking at the door. If anyone hears me calling and opens the door, I will enter his house and have supper with him, and he with me (Rev. 3:20).

Who are the unreached in faith? They are your neighbors, co-workers, friends and acquaintances. Sometimes they are people sitting in the pew next to you. They are inactive and disconnected Catholics, some who may feel alienated from the church, but many more who just lost connection with the faith, and may even still consider themselves Catholics. If someone would just reach out to them in a sincere, credible, and appealing way to invite them back to the faith.

How can you help? Most inactive Catholics are open to an invitation to return to Church if it is done in a kind, compassionate, nonjudgmental manner. All we need to do is to extend a personal invitation to them to come home to the Catholic Church. They are waiting for us to ask!

## Ed Reinhart Receives Distinguished Alumni Award!!

The 2013 recipient of the Holy Cross School distinguished Alumni Award is Edward Joseph Reinhart. He was honored at the Mass on September 15 during the Parish's annual celebration weekend for the Feast of the Triumph of the Holy Cross.

This award is presented to Holy Cross School graduates who have been recognized by their fellow parishioners as living exemplary Catholic lives. It has been presented since 1997, in an effort to provide inspiration to others, encourage current students, and to give thanks to God for the Catholic Faith as represented by the life of this individual.

Ed is the son of the late Edward W. and Mary (Fuhs) Reinhart and is married to Patricia (Adler) Reinhart. He is a lifetime member of Holy Cross Parish and attended Holy Cross School in grades I through 8, graduating for Holy Cross in 1962.

He was nominated for his many achievements and acts of service to Holy Cross and around Gibson county. He holds an Associate Degree in Electronic Engineering Technology, Journeyman Industrial maintenance Mechanic, Bachelor of Science and Master of Science in Human Resource Development,. Ed graduated Summa

Cum Laude with a 4.0 GPA from Indiana State University. He was selected as most outstanding senior by the Industrial Technology Dept. of ISU.

He serves as Eucharistic minister for shut-ins at Holy Cross and is member of the Parish Council. He has been secretary of South Gibson Scholarships, Inc. for 14 years and serves as vice-president of the Ft. Branch High School Alumni Association, becoming president in January 2014. He is the former president of the South Gibson School Corporation and the former president of Holy Cross Education commission.

Ed credits his accomplishments to the great foundation he received at Holy Cross School. "I received a good education at Holy Cross School, and so did my three children, Tim, Brian, and Amy." He continues to be a tireless supporter of Holy Cross School. Ed collected several thousand dollars for the Ft. Branch Gym Fund "Twig House," enabling Holy Cross students to continue athletic and school programs there. It is also used for "Fifth Quarter" activities for South Gibson students. He researched, recorded and annually updates a plaque denoting students of Holy Cross who attained Valedictorian or Salutatorian status while graduating from High School. This plaque hangs in Holy Cross School and represents the rich heritage, beaming pride and academic commitment of our valued Catholic education.

As this year's honoree, Ed was presented with a special cross and framed certificate. His name was also engraved on the Alumni plaque displayed at the front entrance of Holy Cross School.

## JOURNEY MEN By: Chris Cooper



Faith formation is a life-long activity. ### Six Dates For Catholic Couples

This is a parish marriage-building program based on the wisdom of the Catholic Tradition. 
